# Perceptions of careers in aged care: the emerging workforce

### A national study of 18-23-year-old students\*

#### Not considering a career in aged care

The aged care sector does not have strong appeal among tertiary students.



**62%** are unlikely to consider a career in the aged care sector when they finish their course of study.

#### A job rather than a career



**57%** see working in aged care as having a job rather than a career.

### Concerns about the aged care sector



**21%** are concerned that it is not well paid compared to other sectors. **17%** are concerned about about what they have heard about in the news/media.

### Tasks and roles associated with aged care

There's a low level of understanding of the breadth of careers and roles in the sector.



**88%** associate traditional medical and nursing tasks with aged care roles.


#### Main reasons for not considering a career in aged care

where they can achieve a great salary.





#### **Choices by culture**

This study was conducted online by YouGov Galaxy between 6–11 June 2019. The sample comprises 500 tertiary students aged 18–23 years throughout Australia. Age, gender and region quotas were applied to the sample. Following the completion of interviewing, the data was weighted by age, gender and region to reflect the latest ABS population estimates.
